Global School Alliance



Connah's Quay High School is now part of the Global School Alliance.

Since May, we have been partnered with Westminster School in Banfield, Buenos Aries, Argentina and Takamoridai Junior High School in Japan.

We chose to be partnered with schools in these countries as we have a cultural link with the Welsh community in Patagonia and the Toyota factory here in Deeside. Takamoridai Junior High is situated close to the town of Toyota, near Osaka.

Every Monday after school, members of the 'International Club' meet in 001 to work on shared projects with the two schools. The club is open to anyone interested in developing links with our partners. So far, we have shared presentations about schools, Wales, Welsh culture and sports. This term, we have had one live meeting with pupils from Takamoridai and two live meetings with Westminster School. Due to the time difference, the meeting with Japan was very early in the morning.

Our partners have been particularly impressed with the video produced by some of our Year 9 learners – we have some budding filmmakers in our ranks!

We are hoping that we will be able to visit Takamoridai school in June next year; we have applied for funding which would make this visit accessible to all learners. At the time of writing, we are still nervously waiting to hear if we have secured the funds which will make this visit of a lifetime possible.

During the last week of term, we will be hosting a party of Chinese students who will be joining us to experience school life in the UK. They will have buddies from Years 8, 9 and 10 and will attend normal lessons. We are all very excited about this visit!

All of our work with GSA is helping us develop our learners into Ethical, Informed Citizens of the world.

Prince's Trust

The Prince's Trust is a charitable organisation set up to support disadvantaged learners and offer qualifications which can boost employability skills.

Mrs Threadgold has been delivering the Prince's Trust 'Achieve' programme in school over the last two years. We are very proud to announce that all the learners who entered this year have passed and achieved a certificate at either Level One or Level Two – equivalent to two GCSEs.

Learners completed six units of work developing skills such as Teamwork, Health and Wellbeing-Physical Fitness, Presentation Skills and Managing Money.



Visit from Lycée Tristan Corbière, Morlaix, France

On Wednesday 22nd May, a party of 43 learners and 3 teachers from Lycée Tristan Corbière in Morlaix visited CQHS.

Mrs Lewis and Mrs Hughes from the MFL department coordinated the visit.

Activities included a tour of the school, an English lesson, meeting our language ambassadors and a Kahoot quiz about Wales. Mr Luxton, the lead teacher, said that the group really enjoyed their visit and were very impressed with the school's facilities and the reaction they got from our learners.



English as an Additional Language

At the end of April, a group of eight learners from Years 9, 10 and 11 went down to London to participate in a language conference organised by the School of Slavonic and Eastern European Studies; a faculty of University College London (UCL).

We left Shotton station very early in the morning and travelled by train to London Euston where we were met by Dr Ramona Gonczol and escorted to the Laws building at UCL.


We were one of three participating schools, the other two being from the London area. Learners participated in a language lesson, were given a tour of the campus, including the library for Eastern European languages, met students from the faculty and were given presentations about studying at UCL.

At the end of the conference, we visited the Petrie Museum of Egyptology and the Grant Museum of Zoology, which was both freaky and fascinating!

This was the culmination of a series of six lessons delivered after school by teaching staff at SSEES to native speakers of Romanian, Bulgarian and Ukrainian in their home languages.

The purpose has been to:

- Encourage students to maintain their home language whilst living in the UK.
- Be proud of their native languages.
- Introduce learners to the University.
- Tell them that they could do a full degree in their native language at UCL.

Language Learning at CQHS


The Pupil Language Ambassador Team of the Year Award took place on Thursday 27th June via online conference.

The library's success hinges on the leadership and responsibility demonstrated by our Year 7 and 8 learners. The library space is being used for reading, Blooket Club and playing board games.


Do you have a Library Loyalty card?

Our journalist team would love to hear your amazing news and achievements!



The Dangers Children

Should Know About Swimming in Open Water

Whenever the weather gets hot and sticky, and with school holidays fast approaching, you hear devastating news about children and young people getting into difficulties attempting to cool off in open water. Recently, a 16-year-old boy died in the Aire and Calder Navigation canal in Wakefield, and the body of another 16-year-old boy was recovered from water filling an abandoned quarry in Wigan.

As the heatwave continues, the Royal Life Saving Society (RLSS UK, rlss.org.uk) warns that even if a child or young person is a good swimmer and open water looks safe, there can be many hidden dangers.

Here's what parents should make sure children and young people know about the dangers of cooling off in open water!

1. Cold water can kill

RLSS UK says all waters in and around the UK are cold enough to cause cold water shock, even in summer. This shock can make swimming difficult – you may start to hyperventilate, and your blood pressure may shoot up as your body tries to keep the blood warm by moving it towards the middle of your body. As the muscles cool, strength, endurance and muscle control reduce to the point when you may not be able to swim any longer and could have difficulty getting out of the water.

They may feel they are strong swimmers in a warm swimming pool, but swimming in open water is a different story entirely, and cold water shock becomes a real factor.

2. Assess your surroundings

When around water, children need to remember to stop and think. The 'water safety code' says to take time to access your surroundings, look for dangers and research local advice.

Parents should tell children to look for possible dangers before getting into any water. This includes the depth, which may vary in different parts of a body of water.

3. Remember there may

be unseen dangers

There can be many nasty and potentially dangerous surprises lurking underwater, including sharp objects and weeds that can get your legs tangled. Underwater objects and hazards may not be visible!

4. Find out about currents

There may be strong currents in seas and rivers, which may not be at all obvious from the surface but could challenge even the strongest swimmers. There may be warning signs displayed, or local people may know about areas with dangerous currents.

Strong currents can rapidly sweep people away. If you find yourself caught in a riptide, don't swim against it – you'll tire yourself out. Swim with the current and call for help.

5. Look out for lifeguards

and safety equipment

If there are lifeguards at an open water site or even safety equipment like lifebelts, the water is much safer. If there's a lack of safety equipment, rescue is more difficult.

8. Stay near the shore

Warn children not to swim too far away from the shore. Always swim parallel to the shore; that way, you're never too far away from it.

6. Float to live

Parents should make sure children know that floating could help save their lives if they get into difficulty in open water. Remember: **"Float to live"**.

If you fall in or become tired, stay calm, float on your back and call for help. If you see someone in the water, throw something that floats to them and resist the temptation to go in.

9. Know what to do in an

emergency

It's vital that parents make sure their children know what to do if something goes wrong. In an emergency, call 999 and ask for the Fire and Rescue Service when inland and the Coastguard if at the coast.

7. Make sure you're with

friends

Always go swimming with friends or family. Stay together when around water, and always go with family and friends so that if anything goes wrong, you've got someone there to help.
