This was a deeply educational and reflective journey through the battlefields of WWI that ensures the memory of those who fought and fell 'will not be forgotten'.

### Swedish Trainee Teacher Visit

For the second year running, Connah's Quay High School welcomed a group of trainee teachers from Linköping University in Sweden as part of a joint project with Chester University Education Department.

The six students were a truly international group with members from Sweden, Azerbaijan, Palestine, North Macedonia and Cuba. Our visitors spent their timing observing lessons in History, RS, Drama, English and Dance and delivered a very interesting and interactive assembly to Year 9.

During their feedback presentation at Chester University, the group were very complimentary about our school and their experience here. They were surprised to find that we don't use chromebooks for all of our lessons, that teachers and learners have an equal input into lessons and how much work happens during an hour-long lesson. The visitors thought that uniform was a good idea and were impressed that our learners followed the rules regarding mobile phones – apparently, mobile phones cause a lot of problems in Swedish schools. They especially enjoyed Drama and Dance lessons as these are not on the Swedish school curriculum.

The visit was made possible thanks to the hard work of Mrs Davis, and especially Mrs Henderson, Miss Maltby, Mr Moller, Mrs Cox, Ms Brown, Ms Shorthouse and Miss Hoar who welcomed the visitors into lots of their lessons



# Global School Alliance Leadership – Japan Visit

On Sunday, 24th November Mr Forber, Mrs Davis and I returned from a life-changing visit to Japan as part of the Leadership Delegation visit organised by the Global School Alliance.

We were part of a small group with three other teachers from schools near London and Toni Camilleri from GSA, the company that facilitates our international partner schools.

The purpose of the visit was to examine the educational practices in our partner schools and participate in a conference about education and our international activities.

We managed to cram a lot into our week-long visit. We visited Tokyo, Nagoya and Osaka, spent time in four different schools, took part in an international conference and managed to fit in some sightseeing too. We went to some amazing restaurants and had lots of opportunities to practise using chopsticks.

It was fascinating to see how Japanese children learn and engage in their lessons. Some schools we visited had the most amazing facilities but, without a doubt, our favourite visit was to our partner school, Takamoridai Junior High.

We spent a morning there and had fun participating in lessons, eating our lunch with the learners and discussing how they organise their curriculum. Both the staff and learners in Takamoridai J.H welcomed us warmly. It was wonderful to see some familiar faces from the live lesson we held in June with members of the International Club and to meet old friends again. The learners at Takamoridai learn collaboratively and use chromebooks for most of their lessons. They were happy to share what they had been learning with us and we saw English, Science, Geography and Computer Programming classes. As part of the visit, we visited temples in Tokyo and Nara Park and experienced the peace of Buddhist shrines. We felt the buzz of the busy Shibuya Scramble crossing at night and the lively atmosphere of downtown Dotonburi in Osaka. In Dotonburi, we watched live TikToks on the bridge, saw all of the amazing neon advertising displays and tasted Japanese 'Pizza' street food. We went to Osaka Castle and walked around the marina at night.

One particular highlight of our visit was feeding the wild deer in Nara Park, who bow to you for a deer cracker! This beautiful park is full of friendly wild deer and the largest and oldest Buddhist shrine in Japan. There is a 15-metre-high Buddha—you can even climb through 'Buddha's Nostril' for enlightenment!

This visit has given me a good insight into what we can expect when we visit Japan again next June with a party of learners. While much of what we saw and did felt very different, meeting with our Japanese partner students felt very familiar. I am very excited to return to Takamoridai and to share these amazing experiences with learners from CQHS.
